The Experience

You will tour a sake brewery that practices “Traditional Sake Brewing,” a craft inscribed on the UNESCO Intangible Cultural Heritage List. During the tour, an explanation of the sake brewing process will be provided.

Unique Venue Selling Points

Visitors can tour a sake brewery operating since the Edo period and experience traditional brewing firsthand. Afterward, they can enjoy sake tasting with snacks in a charming former sericulture house used until the early Showa period, featuring 100 tatami mats, massive pillars and beams, and transoms crafted from Yakusugi cedar, where visitors can experience the atmosphere of “good old Japan” as if stepping back 200 years in time. If lucky, guests may even encounter a Zashiki-warashi, a legendary spirit said to bring good fortune.
